Dear Colleagues,

As I am sure many of you have seen, President Hall just announced that "in response to the changing situation of the COVID-19 pandemic and the Omicron variant" most courses will be online from January 10-21st, with the plan to return to in-person instruction on January 24th. https://www.uvic.ca/news/topics/2021+notice-january-classes-update+notice As noted: During this brief period, some courses, including those with essential clinical or other experiential, performance, studio or lab components, may continue in person with appropriate approvals by deans and safety protocols in place.

The Association is very pleased to hear this announcement, as it provides certainty to our members in planning the first two weeks of their courses for the coming term, and provides the university and the provincial government more time in which to understand the nature and impact of the Omicron variant in postsecondary settings so that in early January they will be able to plan appropriately for the rest of the term. We very much appreciate that this decision was made now, to allow our members some peace of mind over the holiday break.

While there is no obligation to work on teaching preparation over the holiday break, I've been told that the LTSI has increased their hours over the break for those who wish to do some work on transitioning to online instruction for the first two weeks of term. If any of you are not sure whether your course should be online or not in the first two weeks of term, you should consult with your Chair/Director or Dean. I will respond to urgent questions over the break, and the Association office is open as of January 4th.

Our Vice President, Monica Prendergast, and an FA committee are working with UVic through the Scholars at Risk program to bring an Afghan academic to UVic. We are pleased to be part of the Scholars at Risk initiative here at UVic, but this appeal is a broader one, as your donations would help support the many Afghan scholars, trade unionists, and human rights defenders who are facing immediate danger and would enable CAUT to assist those who need to leave Afghanistan and seek refugee protection.
